

Dear People of St. Catherine's,

Just today it seemed to be ever so slightly less hot than it has been! Can it be that Fall has arrived? It's not very dramatic in Florida, but even here, the light is different as we roll into October. The crepe myrtle has run its course and the air is less sticky. If that's what we get for Fall, I'll take it!

In church also, the light changes, the feel of the air, the sense of the people all change. We are in the last stretch of the church year. It is pledge campaign time and we get back to business. It is the last Fall I will be with you, now that the search committee has received names and is working in earnest to discern the priest God is calling for your new rector. I admit, I am a little weary. Not because I don't still enjoy being with you, leading

you forward, and helping prepare the way for your new rector. I am almost 75 and with my wife's illness I am more tired than I used to be.

But, October is a lively month and we still have work to do to follow Jesus, give a cup of cold water to those who thirst, welcome children and imagine a world of peace and justice. Two moments in October, particularly, call to me. First, on October 10, we will sing "Lift Every Voice and Sing," hymn 599 in our hymnal. This rousing hymn gave its name to the hymnal of African American songs and hymns that we sometimes use. It has words by the great African American poet James Weldon Johnson, with music by his brother. For almost a century it has been sung as an anthem of hope, remembering the "stony road we trod," hoping for a new day. It is a wonderful hymn. There is a movement seeking to designate this as our national hymn. Our Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry has been a leader in this effort. Whether there is political will to do so remains to be seen. But let us sing this hymn on October 10 and rejoice in the gift of such music – as we gather our pledges under the theme *Every Perfect Gift*.

The next Sunday, October 17, we will celebrate the Interfaith National Children's Sabbath. Begun by Marion Wright Edelman, this annual weekend, calls attention to our nation's children, especially those who suffer from poverty, oppression and discrimination. Throughout our country, Christians, Jews, and Muslims – who often fight over trivial matters – will join in lifting up our children and seeking hope for them.

I hope you all are staying well. Covid is still with us. My wife and I just received our annual flu shots and I urge you to do the same. God is still with us. What good news!

Last month as I was preparing my article, despite the dire news of the COVID pandemic, children suffering and dying from the virus, vaccinations waning in their efficacy, news of earthquakes, and hurricanes, and the seemingly precipitous evacuation of Afghanistan, I was filled with hope!



Our Search Committee had met with me and the Diocesan Transition Minister, and was about to begin the hard work of reviewing candidates who felt called to be the 5th Rector of our beloved St. Catherine of Alexandria, assessing their gifts to see if they would be a good match for the faithful pastor called to lead us forward in our journey to do God’s will, to “do all such good works” as the Giver of Life, the Sustainer of Life “hast prepared for us to walk in.” It had been a long time coming, but my heart, our hearts were lifted to God, and for the first time in a very long time, I could see light at the end of the tunnel.

Bernice called. We hadn’t seen her for a couple of weeks as she was visiting family. She’d just driven straight from Pennsylvania, and with all we had to catch up on, the Search Committee, Vestry, Finance Committee and the new budget, the difficulty we were having resuscitating Christian Formation in the age of COVID, and our concern for our favorite Interim Rector, all she was interested in talking about was, “How is your father?” Bernice knew, as most do, that for me the sun rises and sets on my “Daddy” who is living with COPD, like Bernice, but he is dependent on his concentrator 24/7, and for him life is not easy, but still a gift, a perfect gift from the giver of every good gift. I had no idea talking to Bernice that immediately following our conversation she would be transported to the hospital via ambulance, and, a short time thereafter, that she’d be gone, as Fr. Allen put it so beautifully, “passing into the glory of God’s love and mercy.”

Grief overwhelmed me. I can’t explain why. I’ve served at countless Memorial services, dear, dear friends who have gone on to see Glory, and I’ve rejoiced, for them and for my life, richly blessed by their presence in it. Nothing made sense, least of all my *Wheel* article.



Notes from the Junior Warden

I wanted to give a brief update on our HVAC systems at the church. If you have noticed it has been quite warm during our Sunday services. This was due to the 4 units that cool the sanctuary and narthex not functioning at full capacity. Out of 4 units only 1 was at 100%, one was at 75%, and 2 were not working at all. The company we hired to do the work went through the whole building and did routine maintenance such as replacing filters, cleaning coils, clearing drain lines etc. They also diagnosed the previously mentioned issues. Repairs will have been made by the time you read this (keep fingers crossed) and the Sunday services should be much more comfortable.




Next repair to tackle will be new roofing for the parish hall and education wing. More on that later.

Notes from the Treasurer

The past year plus has wreaked havoc with most of our daily lives because of the Covid Pandemic. Each of us has personally experienced or know someone whose life has been adversely affected by this dreaded pandemic. Most every aspect of our lives has been affected and that certainly holds true for the financial operation of our parish. We have a pivotal time for our financial wellbeing coming soon. The Stewardship Campaign for 2022 will begin in October. Our parish response to this campaign will be important to our financial future as we move forward in 2022.



We look forward with great excitement and expectations to having a new rector in 2022. A new rector requires a more costly compensation and benefits than that we currently compensate our interim rector. A new rector requires additional expenditures for pension contribution, health care insurance as well as increased salary and benefits. In addition, we are unsure of the past revenue we generated from Tai Chi renting our facilities for their weekly classes. Tai Chi likes our facility and conducting classes here but they have not been able to resume their classes since the pandemic started last year and what will happen in 2022 is uncertain at best.

These two major factors will make our 2022 Stewardship Campaign more important than ever. Over 80% of our parish income is generated from pledges made by our parishioners so 2022 remains pivotal in our financial position for the upcoming year and the welcoming of our new rector.

We ask each of you to consider all the blessings you have received in this life and to return a portion of those financial blessings to our Lord through St. Catherine of Alexandria Episcopal Church via your pledge for 2022.

Our parish did receive two PPP loans in the last twelve months through our bank. Both these loans have been totally forgiven by our bank.

As we have stated through several monthly articles in this newsletter there are several different ways to make your contribution:

- You may make your contribution on line through our website at www.stcathtt.org.
- You may either mail or drop off your contribution to the church office during business hours, Monday through Thursday, 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM.
- You may place your contribution in the collection plate on Sunday.

It is important for each of us to take care of ourselves and our families during this time of pandemic. Our church family is very important to us and also very supportive. Our faith and trust in our Lord is comforting during these trying times. We thank each of you for your continued support and commitment to St. Catherine of Alexandria Episcopal Church. May each of you and your families stay healthy and safe. This too shall pass.

Every Perfect Gift *October 3: The Gift of Wonder*



I was the kind of child who asked a lot of questions. The world fascinated me, I was filled with wonder. As a consequence, to my inquisitive nature, I learned a lot.

Many kids are like this, asking questions about the world around them, testing the relationships they have experienced. Not only do children ask questions, but they expect answers, and they expect answers that are true. Until children learn to find other sources for information, answers are all they have.

The loss of the innocence of childhood brings an end to asking questions, for some. We become awkward, second guessing our understanding. “Maybe I should know the answer, already?” “I don’t want to be the first to ask.” “They’ll think I’m not paying attention...” We replace the act of wonder with the practice of worry.

Three years ago, our congregation made a special effort to include children in the annual pledge campaign, offering each child the opportunity to have a conversation about their giving and their hopes for the church. We learned two important things: Children are generous – we had 100% participation from the kids, each one of them turned in a pledge card. (And, the treasurers will be happy to know

that we had 100% redemption rate on the pledges, as well!) The second thing we learned, was that the kids had lots of suggestions for ministries, ways to volunteer, ideas about church. Filled out in crayon or pencil, each pledge card was a touching, deeply theological, beautiful expression of generosity and hope – of love.

When Jesus suggests that we must receive the wonder of the world and the work we are given to do as children, I think the example above is exactly why. We must get back in touch with our sense of wonder, of possibility, of love. These are the basic skills God needs from us to work in God’s vineyard.

October 10: The Gift of Sharing

Jesus looking at him and loved him – Mark 10:17-31

Some years ago there was a Cracker Jacks commercial. In it a grandfather is enjoying a box of the popcorn snack. He hears his grandson enter the house and hurriedly hides the box. He asks his grandson, "What did you learn in school today?" The grandson responds with an expectant look on his face, "sharing". Grandpa who is not quite ready to share his snack then asks, "Did you play any games at school today?" The grandson repeats "sharing". Grandpa reluctantly shares the box with grandson who then pours some into his own hand and turns to leave until Grandpa asks "sharing?" and extends his hand. Grandson happily shares.



QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

If we were asked, What did you learn in Christ today?, would our answer be "sharing?"

When I was a child, this was just one example of what it looks like to consider the needs of others and our response to them. No matter where we lived, our home was a haven of rest or refuge for those with varying degrees of need. It could have been giving food to Miss Florene to assist her in feeding her family; or serving as a temporary home for Miss Alice's children when their parents were engaged in domestic abuse situations; or caring for newborn twins experiencing narcotics withdrawal due to

a mom who struggled with addiction. It could have been providing our living room as a guest room for someone in need. Or it could have been ensuring there was always a place at our table for the unexpected guest. How often do we look at another and love them?

The love of God comes to us in various and sundry ways. When we look at our neighbors, family and friends through eyes of compassion and love and act with a spirit of gratitude and generosity, we recognize with God all things are possible. When we acknowledge the personhood of the other, particularly those who society would deem the least or the last person one would offer a place at one's table, then that person becomes the first to receive an invitation. We experience God's love most fully when we are able to give of ourselves for the good of others. | TENS.org

Every Perfect Gift *October 17: The Gift of Helping a Stranger*

Last summer, I ran out of gas at a gas station. The car stopped moving a few yards from the pump. To my great relief, another customer came over and offered to push my car to the pump. Before this kind, young person drove away, I shouted “Wait!” and hurried toward him. He shook his head from side to side. “I don’t want anything for helping you,” he declared. “Not even homemade chocolate chip cookies?” I countered. He laughed, took the bag of cookies, and thanked me.

When we share the gift of being human beings together, especially in difficult moments, we slip into an awareness of abundance. We feel full. We know goodness given and received. Travels continue. Cookies and laughter are enjoyed. Every good gift comes from God, and in sharing our gifts we become even more gifted, whether or not we are recognized or rewarded for sharing.

Sometimes we step up to help from a desire for recognition. We offer our gifts, like James and John in today’s Gospel text, out of loyalty to Jesus and a desire to be useful. Our egos may be attached in healthy, or unhealthy, ways.

Sometimes we share a gift without expectations. We give without needing recognition. We push a car for a stranger and get a tired priest, her daughter and two dogs back on the road to Vacationland.

Making an annual financial commitment to a congregation is like offering to push a stranger’s car to a gas pump. It gets ministry moving. We seek no recognition, yet are rewarded in surprising ways. We offer our gifts because doing so creates the type of world we want to inhabit — a world where strangers collaborate and laugh together during a frustrating and embarrassing experience, sharing every good gift along the way. | TENS.org

October 24: The Gift of Faith

Our often fast-paced, frenetic lives get in the way of the north stars that should be guiding us. And trajectories change when, in the blink of an eye, we are blindsided.

My family's blindside happened four years ago. On a Tuesday morning before work, my sister-in-law Jan was on a walk with the kid's five-month-old puppy Peter Paul. A young man speeding hit them head-on, killing them instantly.

Jan was married to my twin brother Jonathan, and they have twelve children, including ten adopted from Texas, Guatemala, Mexico, Russia, China, and Ethiopia. She was also a beloved breast cancer physician with a practice that served the underserved.

Never afraid to love well, Jan was confident in her faith and marriage, leading her and Jonathan to adopt several older children with traumatic histories. They gave these children second chances believing they could thrive in a loving Christian family and a supportive community.

Jan's ministry on earth informed our belief that gratitude increases with faith. She saw with her heart.

In today's reading, we find Bartimeus, a blind beggar with a deep faith in God living on society's margins. He cries out to Jesus as he's leaving Jericho, "Son of David, have mercy on me." Jesus asks, "what do you want from me?" and Bartimeus says, "Heal Me." Jesus heals him and says, "Go, your faith has made you well."

I find a parallel between Bartimeus' story and Jan's life. Bartimeus' miraculous healing happened because of his faith. He saw with his heart. And Jan, relying on her faith to help her overcome obstacles, inspired her family, friends, and patients to do the same."

Thomas Merton said, "Gratitude is the heart of the Christian life." May our faith continue to increase our gratitude so we, in turn, can live with seeing hearts. | [TENS.org](https://www.tens.org)

Every Perfect Gift *October 31: The Gift of Love in Action*



When reading this week's Gospel, I'm primed to expect confrontation of some sort. Given how Jesus was treated by religious leaders of the day, I expect a trap. However, the interaction with the scribe is entirely different. The scribe approaches Jesus with a sincere question, "Which commandment is the first of all?"

Jesus's response is a "drop the mic" kind of moment – boom – end of story! Not only did the scribe agree with Jesus's answer, but every faithful person hearing the response would have agreed as well, given that his reply was part of their affirmation of faith. Today, it's part of our Catechism and it is a call to action – "love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength and love your neighbor as you would yourself".

That "all-in" kind of love for God and agape love for our neighbor is foundational to our stewardship efforts. It requires faithfulness, inclusion and commitment to something bigger than self. We saw examples of this kind of agape love demonstrated during the pandemic in mask wearing, social distancing, and caring for the most vulnerable. All of those efforts were examples of love for our neighbor in action.

Pandemic life also illustrated the importance of faith and connection to - and care for- our neighbors. Additionally, the pandemic highlighted loneliness, inequities, and profound need in our world.

As we transition to post pandemic life, I pray that our eyes are opened and we acknowledge there is work to be done. Work that is core to both our Christian identity and philosophy of stewardship. Stewardship is the balm that allows our communities of faith to tend to a host of needs including loneliness, inequity, and need in our world.


