

Dear People of St. Catherine's,

On April 1, the sprinkler system repairman is coming to fix the sprinkler system in my yard. For some reason it has stopped working, as evidenced by the brownish color of the grass around my house. Most other houses in my neighborhood have greener grass surrounding them, even in this dry season of the year. Unhappily, the little control box on the side of my house is kaput, or just not working, and my sprinklers don't turn on as they should early on Thursday mornings.

My brown lawn is an apt metaphor for how life feels about now. At our last Lenten program several of us remarked at how tired we are, burned out by the pandemic, dried out like brown grass. Weary with "Zoom" fatigue. Dry and wasted.

For some reason I remembered Brahms *German Requiem* and recalled that the second movement begins with these words:

*For all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass.
The grass withers, and the flower fades.*

Even as the world begins to open up a little and the light lingers later into the day and we feel some hope, we may still feel like brown grass that has not been watered. Brahms continues in his *Requiem*:

*Be patient, therefore, beloved, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer
waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until
it received the early and later rains.*

Living in Florida, we know very well the cycles of wet and dry seasons. We know that, soon, the fields of dry, brown grass near my house in Wesley Chapel, will be charged with bright green and both the early and later rains will replenish the land.

Easter always presents itself in a burst of flowers, brightness, song and joy. But what if we imagined the grandeur of the world as the green returning to a dry land. Brahms continues this movement of the *Requiem*:

But the word of the Lord endures forever.

It is the word of the Lord that remembered Noah, the word of the Lord that called Abraham, the word of the Lord that called the people to covenant with him, the word of the Lord that called all people to him in Jesus, the word of the Lord that made us whole. It is the word of the Lord that called to Jesus in the quiet of the tomb and said, “Rise and go forth and let the grass live again and let the people rejoice.”

And Johannes Brahms reached into the prophet Isaiah once more and sang:

*And the ransomed of the Lord shall return,
and come to Zion with singing;
everlasting joy shall be upon their heads;
they shall obtain joy and gladness,
and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.*

It has been a dry and brown, brittle year in this time of pandemic, unrest and turmoil. We could use some rain – early or later – to replenish us. I’m looking forward to hearing the “whoosh” of my sprinklers very soon. In the performance of Brahms Requiem, this second movement, that begins somberly with dry grass, rushes to its conclusion in a great fugue of joy, excitement that can hardly be contained. Not a bad mood for Easter.

I wish each of you the most joyous Easter, and pray that the early and later rains will refresh our lives and bring us hope.

Notes from the Senior Warden

Storytelling. Everyone has a family, and every family has a story. “This is Us” chronicles the Pearson family across the decades, from Jack (Milo Ventimiglia) and Rebecca (Mandy Moore) as young parents in the 1980’s to their 37 year old kids, Kevin, Kate, and Randall, searching for love and fulfillment in the present day. This grounded, life-affirming “dramedy” reveals how the tiniest events in our lives impact who we become, and how the connections we share with each other can transcend time, distance and even death. In



“One Small Step, this week’s episode, beginning with a flashback to July 20, 1969 when the “impossible became possible,” we got a deeper glimpse into the life of Nicky, Jack’s socially awkward, horn-rimmed glasses, long haired younger brother who remained in the family home after his big brother Jack had left because their father, who was an abusive alcoholic, was “better” with their mother when he was around. We don’t know a lot about Nicky except that he had been a medic in Vietnam and that he had not transitioned well back into civilian life. As this week’s story opens, we learn that he lives alone in an old trailer from which in 50 years he rarely if ever emerges, that he has received an invitation to the Baptism of his nephew Kevin’s twins, and that the boy child was named after him. Against all probability, he begins to make plans to attend the Baptism in California, not understanding it is actually a Zoom event!

On Ash Wednesday we were invited to the observance of a Holy Lent. We’ve been on this journey for almost 40 days. Almost 40 days, but, as Fr. Allen reminded us on Palm Sunday, if you’re going to go from ‘here’ to ‘there,’ you have to make the journey, and, more likely than not, “If you’re going to go from ‘here’ to ‘there,’ you’re likely to find trouble – if you go in the name of God.” As I write this, we haven’t yet completed that journey, but it is there, with all the “anxiety, fear, worry, excitement, hope... that we feel when we stand before the stretch we must cross to find peace and healing and life.”

Nicky’s journey to California to attend the Baptism of his namesake was fraught with “trouble,” as was Neil Armstrong’s when Apollo 11 landed on the moon, but when the astronaut planted the first human foot on another world with more than half a billion people watching on TV, “the impossible became possible.” When Jesus, mounted on a donkey, rode into Jerusalem, he knew there would be “trouble,” but he also knew that he would not be alone, as we are never alone on our journey because God is with us always.

Storytelling. In our **Search Process** journey to call the 5th Rector of St. Catherine's, we've had to go through a lot of "trouble," getting "from there to here," and as many of us know, it's that last leg, those last steps that seem the longest. Despite the pandemic and all else, we've been blessed on our journey in so many ways, with the leadership of our Interim Rector, and with those who have worked on our subcommittees, most recently the **Profile Subcommittee**, to tell the story of our beloved Parish. The Profile is just about complete, as is the OTM Portfolio (Office of Transition Ministry). It is with gratitude that I share that there is now a pool of parishioners interested in serving on the **Search Committee**, and they will soon receive applications to complete. Once the Vestry and the Bishop approve the Committee, we will meet in retreat with the Rev'd Canon Richard Norman, the Diocesan Transition Minister, after which an "official list of candidates" will be sent to the **Search Committee** to begin its review.

As we enter the Triduum, the three days commemorating the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Jesus, we do so knowing that the hope and joy of Easter is soon to come, even though we have yet to get from "here" to "there." May we feel God's presence with us as we take the last steps of this journey together.



Notes from the Treasurer

Hopefully all or most of our parish has had or have scheduled your Covid-19 Vaccine.

Financially, our parish is currently on solid ground as long as our parishioners continue to honor our pledges for 2021 as we have done thus far. Good news for our parish is that we were recently approved a totally forgivable PPP Loan from our bank, Pilot Bank. This is a loan through the federal government which will allow us to pay our payroll for ten weeks from this loan. The benefit this will have for St. Catherine's for 2021 is that we will not be forced to take some of the earnings from our Endowment Fund to balance our 2021 budget. This loan will enable us to meet all our projected expenses for the year 2021 without touching the Endowment Fund Earnings.



Streaming of our weekly 10 AM service on Facebook and YouTube has allowed our congregation to reach out to folks who normally would not have access to our parish and to that we are grateful. Our parish has met a lot of new folks, some of whom have become an integral part of our congregation, through this process. We are grateful for those in our parish who work hard each week to make that happen and have transformed the tragedy of this pandemic into something that will benefit St. Catherine's in the future and permit another means for us to spread God's word to those who might not have received it otherwise.

- You may place your contribution in the collection plate on Sunday.






LIVE STREAM UPDATES

Dear Parish Members:

Thank you for your generous donation to the St. Vincent de Paul Society conference at Corpus Christi Catholic Church, during 2020, in the amount of \$ **1,500**.

During the past year our volunteers assisted 2,695 families with 109,529 lbs of food, including fresh produce and frozen meat, and \$ 27,000 in financial assistance. Our volunteers make hospital visits and pet therapy visits although, these were limited this year due to the quarantine for COVID. Also, turkeys for over 200 families were provided in November for Thanksgiving and toys for over 200 children in 65 families were distributed for Christmas in December.


In addition, our Faith and Grace Garden is flourishing and our neighbors, whom we serve, are offered fresh vegetables and herbs from the garden each week. The pantry also partners with Focus Academy and their community based job training program.

Without the continued support of caring people like you, we would not be able to continue the mission of the St. Vincent de Paul Society—***Face to face assistance to the poor***. Your gift has made a difference in the lives of so many individuals in our community this past year.

Our St. Vincent de Paul, Joe Latina Center, opened in January 2018. It is located immediately behind the Wells Fargo Bank, next to Corpus Christi Catholic Church.

The hours for financial assistance are Monday and Wednesday 9-11 a.m. Food is distributed each Saturday from 9-11 a.m. May God continue bless you.

2021 HOPE Nehemiah Action - Hillsborough County has HOPE for Justice

1800 computers, tablets or smart phones were connected in a Zoom meeting that brought together 24 faith communities working for justice. At this annual meeting HOPE invited county commissioners, the state attorney, public defender, chief judge and clerk of the court to hear HOPE identify community issues and ask for their support in seeking solutions. Here is what HOPE is working on and what they asked stake holders to support.

Access to Mental Health and Addiction Services

Hillsborough County has a behavioral health crisis. Daycare Community Assessments consistency identify Mental Health and Substance Use disorder as a top health priority. The Departments of Health (DOH) in Hillsborough and surrounding counties developed a coordinated implementation plan to address Behavioral Health as their top priority. Our county jail is a warehouse for people with mental health and addiction challenges with 40% on psychotropic medications for serious mental illness and 80% have co-occurring mental illness and addiction. Lack of services, high cost of services, lack of transportation and lack of stable housing all create barriers to access to mental health and addiction services.

HOPE asked County Commissioners Kemp, Overman and Smith to work with county staff to identify local funds in the 2022 County Budget to establish an internationally accredited Recovery Through Work Clubhouse, which is a proven best practice model for promoting the economic and social stability of people with severe mental illness. All the commissioners agreed and also agreed to meet with HOPE in May to discuss the request further.

Criminal Justice Reform

Youth Civil Citations: When a child receives a civil citation, they are twice as likely not to reoffend, and it saves taxpayers \$4,600 per civil citation. The civil citation program effectively holds children accountable for their actions by requiring community service and counseling while avoiding a damaging arrest record. Successful youth civil citation programs in other counties have secondary eligibility screening that successfully diverts children who are eligible. HOPE asked State Attorney Warren, Public Defender Holt, Chief Judge Ficarrota and Clerk of Court Stuart if they would encourage and work with other stakeholders to implement secondary eligibility screening to reduce arrests for children. They all agreed.

Reducing Adult Arrests: They also agreed to work with HOPE to find ways to reduce adult arrests for minor offenses. Too many adults are arrested for first time nonviolent misdemeanors causing financial difficulties for individuals, their families and the community.

Systemic Bias in Policing: Many HOPE members told stories of either themselves or family members being stopped by law enforcement because of the color of their skin. Warren, Holt, Ficarrota and Stuart agreed to attend a summit with a professor from Northeastern University who has worked with law enforcement agencies to create a stop data collection form to record all law enforcement interactions to analyze the data to identify instances of bias in policing. This methodology of tracking, analyzing, and communication with the community has successfully built trust between law enforcement and the community.

EPISCOPAL CHARITIES FUND

Since its inception in 2009, Episcopal Charities Fund has grown in both reach and scope as it supports congregation-based ministries across Southwest Florida. The fund began with \$36,000 in seed money from various small gifts. That \$36,000 grew to over \$1,046,000 at the end of 2020, thanks to generous donations from you and the wise stewardship of our Endowment Fund Board.

One of our first grant recipients was to the backpack ministry at St. David, Englewood, which is now a mission-centered parish well known for their outreach within the community. St. George's Food Pantry in Bradenton was also among our first grant recipients; their Episcopal Charities grant helped the parish replace essential appliances in their food pantry. During and after Hurricane Irma, these parishes have provided essential foods and household supplies to many hourly workers who had lost incomes. Because of you, Episcopal Charities now provides over \$42,000 in annual support to such parish-based ministries.

DAYSPRING ENDOWMENT FUND

DaySpring Episcopal Center is the 97-acre retreat center at the heart of our diocesan life. DaySpring serves our Episcopal churches with leadership development, Christian education, fellowship and worship, while also serving a wider national community. Each year, DaySpring supports over 5,000 youth in various programs by our Episcopal churches, other denominations and both public and private schools. Our campus is enjoyed by the likes of local non-profit arts groups, Ivy League college rowing teams, and church based 12-step programs. It is home to our diocesan School for Ministry, which trains people in ministry and offers a variety of programs and events which support our own Episcopal congregations.

In 2017, we greatly expanded the offerings at DaySpring with the completion of our Program Center and Pool and renovation of the Tripp Pavilion. Your donation to the DaySpring Endowment Fund - now valued at over \$1,193,000 - protects this legacy and ensures the permanent viability of DaySpring through ongoing capital maintenance and improvements.


